# Candidates for United States Congress, Hawaii Governor, Lt. Governor, Hawaii State Senate & Hawaii State House of Representatives

Hawaii Family Forum is a non-partisan, 501(c)(3) organization and does not endorse or oppose any candidate for elected office, whether or not they responded to this survey. We offer this guide to educate the community in Hawaii about the views of the candidates for the office of which they are running.

We understand that many candidates did not respond to the survey, so all links on the electronic PDF version are interactive. The online version will enable you to enlarge the text. Hover over the underlined web addresses and you will be directed to the website. We encourage you to call your candidates at the phone numbers provided and/or visit their campaign websites to find out more information, especially if they did not respond to the survey. Please be courteous when making contact with any candidate for public office.

#### **Keep Your Voter Registration Current**

Ballots are mailed to the mailing address associated with your voter registration. If you move to a new residence, change your mailing address or name, you must update your voter registration. You may check online or contact your County Elections Division to confirm that your registration record is current.

#### Receiving Your Ballot

You will receive a GENERAL election mail ballot packet no later than **October 21, 2022**. Your packet consists of a ballot, ballot secrecy sleeve, and a prepaid postage return ballot envelope.

Voters with special needs may request for an electronic ballot through the Voter Registration Application or by contacting their County Elections Division.

#### **Returning Your Ballot**

You may return your completed ballot by mail or in person at a designated place of deposit within your county. Please keep in mind that ballots must be received by your County Elections Division by 7:00 p.m. on Election Day.

#### **Tracking Your Ballot**

You may check on the status of your ballot, whether it has been mailed and/or received, by contacting your County Elections Division. Track your ballot at <a href="https://hawaii.ballottrax.net/voter/">https://hawaii.ballottrax.net/voter/</a>

#### **Processing Your Ballot**

Upon receipt of your return envelope, your County Elections Division validates the signature to confirm your identity. After your signature is validated, your ballot will be forwarded to state election officials to be counted.

# **Voting at a Voter Service Center**

The County Elections Divisions establish voter service centers that will be open 10 days prior and on Election Day. Services include accessible in person voting and same day registration.

A major reason the people are hurting is because they keep electing just one party, which means little to no opposition to bad policies. Of 25 state senators, there is only 1 Republican, with the rest Democrats. Of 51 state representatives, there are only 4 Republicans, with the rest Democrats. It is the most lopsided legislature in the country, and Hawaii has been paying the price, with it often coming in at or near the bottom of the country on critical issues such as education, small business friendliness and price of electricity. As a Republican, I am already working to get more Republicans elected to turn the tide for the better. People have lost their health, jobs and businesses because of poor Covid policies. I will work to prevent more of that taking place and to give the people choices, not mandates. Already there is talk of other, largely manufactured, pandemic scares in the near future. The cost of housing is so high that many are going homeless or moving to the mainland. According to experts in the local housing field, there are ways of bringing the cost down and increasing affordable home ownership, releasing people from forever rentals. That will also be a top priority. Oahu's drinking water has been polluted by the fuel releases at the Red Hill Bulk Fuel Facility. The Navy says that the fuel pipes are in such disrepair that the 100 million gallons still in the tanks can't be removed until the end of 2024. I was the Red Hill Fuel Tank Committee Chair at the Aiea Neighborhood Board for three years, through June 2021, and have continued my research since stepping down. While the Red Hill situation is not the legislature's kuleana, it is influential. I know the system better than other legislators and will help work to get the fuel removed expeditiously and safely based on facts, not ungrounded wishes or demands.
