Result	Description	Vote	
Passed	SB80 by Senator Greg Miller bans law-abiding citizens from conducting lawful exit interviews at polling precincts in our State. This flagrantly unconstitutional bill violates core free speech rights protected in our Constitution. The bill allows only "bonafide" media organizations like CNN and MSNBC to conduct exit interviews. This is arguably the worst bill of the entire legislative session. Louisiana is the only state in the Country that discriminates in such a way against ordinary Louisiana citizens.	Y	✗
Passed	SB 244 by Senator Bob Hensgens was amended in the House by Rep. Brett Geymann to provide significant protections for private property owners against the seizure of their property against their will for Carbon Capture Sequestration. Specifically, the House amendments repealed Louisiana law that CCS is a "public good" for purposes of eminent domain and require that CCS operators must be "common carriers" in order to be able to use eminent domain for CCS projects. Both of these amendments were hugely important. The House voted in favor of the these amendments on the House floor.	Y	✓
Passed	SB 46 by Senator Fesi' will prohibit geo-engineering in Louisiana. This is the process of dumping toxic chemicals out of planes for the purpose of altering the weather, controlling the climate, and blocking the sun. This dangerous, harmful, and insane practice has already been banned in multiple other states.	N	✗

Passed	<p>HB519 bans the use of a handheld cellphone in your vehicle. There is no credible evidence that talking on a handheld cellphone increases traffic accidents, and banning their use by law-abiding citizens constitutes government overreach that will lead to further infringements of personal freedom. Further, contrary to the way the bill was sold, the law will do nothing to decrease insurance rates for Louisiana citizens.</p>	Y	✗
Passed	<p>HB400 by Rep. Chenevert would repeal current Louisiana law that, shockingly, allows a minor to seek and receive medical and counseling services without the knowledge or consent of their parents or legal guardian. This was an extremely important bill that would require that parents and/or legal guardians have knowledge and consent to any medical care or services on their minor children.</p>	Y	✓
Passed	<p>HB 148 by Rep. Wiley is a very bad bill that vests total authority in the Louisiana Commissioner of Insurance to adjust insurance rates/premiums with no accountability and no required criteria based on actuarial data or market conditions. The Bill further allows the Commissioner to raise premiums on policy-holders retroactively, as well as order insurers to pay refunds to policy-holders retroactively. It is bad policy to vest this kind of plenary authority in one executive agency, especially when it is not tied to any objective criteria or regulatory control. It will hurt both Louisiana consumers and insurance companies.</p>	Y	✗
Passed	<p>HB 685 by Rep. Chenevert would remove DEI and CRT from Louisiana public agencies and colleges. These radical, anti-American concepts foster division and mistrust, and teach Louisiana citizens to view each other and our country through the lens of race and gender instead of as fellow Americans committed to common basic principles of freedom and liberty.</p>	NV	—
Passed	<p>HB160 by Rep. Dickerson would have required that a complainant in a formal ethics complaint against another Louisiana citizen must disclose their identity. No person should have to face a serious ethics charge and NEVER be allowed to know the identity of the person who is accusing them. There were strong whistleblower protections in the bill that would have protected a complainant against retaliation. This is the United States of America, and it is unfathomable that somebody should be able to remain anonymous in such a situation like this.</p>	NV	—

Failed	HB 615 by Rep. Brett Geymann would have conferred significant authority in LOCAL governments in the permitting and regulation of solar energy generation facilities in their parishes. THESE are the people who will be most directly affected, and it is highly unfortunate that a Republican dominated House defeated this bill on the House floor.	Y	✓
Passed	HB 206 by Rep. Mellerine was a bad bill that would have allowed the legislature to ratify illegal election agreements through a "concurrent resolution" instead of by passing a bill in the proper way to cure the illegality. This bill as written was both unconstitutional and unwise.	Y	✗
Passed	HB 304 by Rep. Robbie Carter requires that any civil action brought to seize private property for Carbon Capture Sequestration pipelines or injection wells must be brought in the parish where the private property is located. This Bill would simply allow slightly less stress for a property owner by not having to travel out of his home parish or even across the State to defend his property rights in an expropriation action. Passed	HB 577 by Rep. Deshotel guts the traditional competitive bidding process for Louisiana's new voting system and vests vast, largely unchecked authority in the Louisiana Secretary of State to make this most consequential decision involving not only the security of our elections but the spending of a huge amount of taxpayer money. This bill is very ill-advised.	Y	✗
Failed	HB608 would have provided protection for Louisiana citizens against the insane practice of geo-engineering or "chemtrails." It was a very good bill and a needed one.	N	✗
Passed	HB 307 by Rep. Chance Henry requires that all public agencies and officials must report to federal immigration authorities any illegal alien who is receiving or applying to receive any public benefits in our State. The bill also requires that any benefits being received by any illegal alien be terminated.	NV	—
Passed	HB 64 by Rep. Mike Johnson codifies the sovereign right of the Attorney General to rescind, nullify, or disapprove any consent agreements entered into between any local or municipal agency and the federal government, IF those agreements impact our sovereignty as a state under the 10th amendment of the US Constitution. Passed	HB 590 by Rep. Spell would have prohibited all funding of Louisiana elections, campaigns, candidates, or ballot propositions by any non-citizen of the United States.	Y	✓

Passed	SB89 would have required the Senate to approve the Governor's appointments to the powerful Port of Orleans Commission. The bill was passed and vetoed by the Governor.	Y	✓
Passed	SB 19 will allow Ivermectin to be obtained over the counter in Louisiana. Very important bill.	Y	✓
Passed	SB14 by Sen. McMath is an excellent bill that will help keep our kids healthy by removing the garbage from they food they eat.	Y	✓
Failed	This bill protects property owners from being discriminated against financially if they do not voluntarily give up their land for Carbon Capture Sequestration.	N	✗
Passed	SB 111 is a very good bill that would have ensured a much fairer claims process in personal injury claims.	N	✗
Passed	SB 15 is an important Bill that criminalizes any public official who deliberately interferes with federal ICE efforts to remove illegal immigrants from the Country.	NV	—
