The representatives who voted in favor of this bill are standing for individual rights and for holding mandating public and private employers accountable for any ill-effects of their decision to mandate the Covid shot. Failed	This bill simply would have prohibited financial incentives or penalties to encourage healthcare providers to administer vaccinations. This is a protection for patients - to ensure that the vaccination is in the best interest of their health and not that of the financial interest of a healthcare provider.
